

# PCS18 Prepare, apply and attach dressings, wound supports and drains to patients

#### **OVERVIEW**

This standard covers assisting with the preparation and application of dressings, wound supports and drains following surgical intervention. You will be working in a 'scrubbed' role whilst undertaking these activities. Users of this standard will need to ensure that practice reflects up to date information and policies. Version No 1

### KNOWLEDGE AND UNDERSTANDING

You will need to know and understand:

- 1.The current European and National legislation, national guidelines, organisational policies and protocols in accordance with Clinical/Corporate Governance which affect your work practice in relation to preparing, applying and attaching dressings, wound supports and drains to patients
- 2.Your responsibilities and accountability in relation to the current European and National legislation, national guidelines and local policies and protocols and Clinical/Corporate Governance
- 3. The duty to report any acts or omissions in care that could be detrimental to yourself, other individuals or your employer
- 4. The importance of working within your own sphere of competence and seeking advice when faced with situations outside your sphere of competence
- 5. The application of standard precautions to the preparation and application of dressings, wound supports and drains and the of potential consequences of poor practice
- 6. The anatomy of the skeleton and peripheral nervous system related to the application of cast materials
- 7.The anatomy and physiology of the skin related to the application of dressings and wound supports
- 8. The principles of wound healing
- 9.Potential complications of wound healing
- 10.The following:

1.asepsis

2.antisepsis

3.cross infection

11. How the surgical field contributes to the control of infection

12.Potential sources of contamination when preparing surgical fields and appropriate

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measures to reduce or deal with them

- 13. The types and action of pathogens specific to the surgical patient and wound infection
- 14. The potential consequences of wound contamination
- 15.The types, purpose and function of medical devices used in the application of dressings, wound supports and drains
- 16.Potential hazards associated with the use of medical devices used in the application of dressings, wound supports and drains
- 17.Factors which affect the choice of medical devices for individual patients
- 18.Factors which affect the choice of appropriate sites for attaching medical devices during patient preparation
- 19.Factors to consider in choosing dressings, wound supports and drains for individual patients
- 20.The principles of wound care and dressings, including peripheral circulation assessment (manual or Doppler) wound care and drainage
- 21.Methods and techniques for preparing and applying dressings and wound supports
- 22.Methods and techniques for preparing, attaching and securing drains
- 23.The scrub role in relation to the application of dressings, wound supports and drains and how this promotes effective team practice
- 24. The specific lines of accountability within the surgical team
- 25.The information which should be recorded in relation to the application of dressings, wound supports and drains
- 26.The importance of recording information relating to the application of dressings, wound supports and drains
- 27.The importance of immediately reporting any issues which are outside your own sphere of competence without delay to the relevant member of staff

## PERFORMANCE CRITERIA

You must be able to do the following:

- 1.apply standard precautions for infection prevention and control and other relevant health and safety measures
- 2.give the patient relevant information, support and reassurance in a manner which is sensitive to their needs and concerns
- 3.select and prepare an appropriate dressing or wound support to suit the size and type of wound
- 4.use suitable non-allergenic dressings where patient allergies have been identified 5.prepare specified drains ready for use
- 6.apply or attach the dressing, wound support or drain:
  - 1.using appropriate techniques
  - 2.in line with manufacturer's instructions
  - 3.in a manner which optimises the patient's comfort and dignity and minimises pain and trauma
- 7.maintain the sterility of the sterile dressing or wound support prior to and during application

8.check that:

1.the pressure exerted by the dressing or wound support is consistent with the type of wound

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4.drains are positioned to prevent inappropriate syphonage and/or patient harm 9.ensure required information regarding the attached dressings, wound supports and drains are noted in the patient's documentation
